Stephen N. Weed of Wynnewood, PA went home to be with the Lord on Tuesday June 16, 2026, at the age of 73.

Steve was born to Irving and Shirley Weed in White Plains, NY on March 17, 1953. He graduated from Governor Livingston High School in Berkeley Heights, NJ and went on to college at Wake Forest University, studying religion. At Wake Forest, he met his wife, Teri. They married in 1975 and moved to Massachusetts where Steve attended Gordon Conwell Theological Seminary to earn his MDiv and pursue his calling as a pastor.

He was a beloved pastor for 43 years, serving two congregations: Bethany Presbyterian Church in Zuni, VA from 1980-1991 and Narberth Presbyterian Church in Narberth, PA from 1991-2023. Steve was also a loving husband, father, grandfather and friend to many. He is survived by his wife, Teri, his two children, J. Matthew (Linshuang Lu) and Bethany, and his grandson, Joshua.

Steve was an avid baseball fan, runner, punster, and lover of people, dark chocolate and birthday cards. But his main desire was to love and serve God with kindness. In retirement, he made it his mission to be “loose change in God’s pocket,” living his life with a spirit of openness to the ways God might use him to bless others. Even through his two-year journey with cancer and five-week-long hospital stay, he lived abundantly and joyfully.
